ing, paying, and accounting for the said Annuities payable by virtue of this Act, and also for the Service, Pains, and Labour, of the said Accountant General for performing the Trusts hereby reposed in him; all which Allowances to be made as aforesaid, in respect of the Service, Pains, and Labour of any Officer or Officers of the said Governor and Company, shall be for the Use and Benefit of the said Governor and Company, and at their Dissosal only.

No Fee to be taken for converting Life Aumuities into Annuities for a Term of Years, on Penalty of ap. l. Officers of the said Governor and Company, shall be for the Use and Benefit of the said Governor and Company, and at their Disposal only.

XXII. And be it further enacted, That no Fee, Reward, or Gratuity whatsoever shall be demanded or taken of any of his Majesty's Subjects, for converting the Interest of any Person or Persons of or to any Life Annuities, or any of them, into certain Interests for Terms of Years in pursuance of this Act, or for paying the said Annuities, or any of them, or for any Transfer of any Sum to be made in pursuance of this Act, upon Pain that any Officer or Person offending, by taking or demanding any such Fee, Reward, or Gratuity, shall, for every such Offence, forfeit the Sum of Twenty Pounds to the Party aggrieved, with sufful Costs of Suit, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of his Majesty's Courts at Westminster, wherein no Essoin, Protection, Privilege, or Wager at Law, Injunction, or Order of Restraint, or any more than one Imparlance, shall be granted or allowed.

XXIII. And be it further enacted by the Authority atoresaid, That if any Person or Persons shall forge, counterseit, or alter, or cause or procure to be forged, counterseited, or altered, or knowingly or wilfully act or affist in the forging, counterseiting, or altering any Indosement or Writing on the Back of any Certificate or Certificates, made out as is herein-before mentioned by the Cashier or Cashiers of the Bank of England, or any Receipt or Receipts to be given, or any Certificate or Certificates to be made out by the

XXIII. ## C A P. XLVI.

An A& for fettling and fecuring a certain Annuity for the Use of the Heirs and Descendants of William Penn, Esquire, the original Proprietor of the Province of Pennsylvania, in Confideration of the meritorious Services of the said William Penn, and of the Losses which his Family have sustained in consequence of the unhappy Dissensions in America.

"Letters Patent of King Charles II. and an Act of the State of Pennsylvania, "for vesting the Estates of the late "Proprietaries of Pennsylvania, in this Commonwealth," recited. An Annuity of 4,000 s. to be issued Quarterly out of the Consolidated Fund to William Baker and Andrew Allen, Esqrs. in Trust for John Penn of Stoke Pogis, and John Penn of Wimpole Street, Esqrs. to commence Jan. 5, 1790. The Commissioners of the Treasury are by Warrant to direct the Auditor of the Exchequer to make forth and pass Debentures for

the said Annuity, without any Fees. Such Warrant not to be determinable on the Demise of his Majesty. Officers of the Treasury and Exchequer to do all necessary Asts without Fee. The Trustees to
convey with all convenient Speed the said Annuity to Messrs. Penn, and in the mean Time to receive
the Annuity, and pay it to the proper Parties. The Receipt of the Trustees, &c. to be a sufficient Discharge for the Annuity, which is to be paid free of all Taxes. Annuity to be considered as real Property issuing out of Lands in Middlesex. Conveyance of the Annuity to be involled in Chancery, and
entered with the Auditor of the Exchequer. Public Act. Trustees to be answerable for their own Acts only, and may reimburse themselves their necessary Expences.'

## C A P. XLVII.

An Act for enabling his Majesty to authorize his Governor or Lieutenant Governor of such Places beyond the Seas, to which Felons or other Offenders may be transported, to remit the Sentences of fuch Offenders.

WHEREAS by several Orders made by his Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, Preamble, in pursuance of Authority given to his Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, Preamble. in pursuance of Authority given to his Majesty in that Behalf, by an A& passed in the Twenty-fourth Year of his Majesty's Reign, intituled, An A& for the effectual Transportation of Felons and other Offenders; and to authorize the Removal of Prisoners in certain Cases, and for other Purposes therein mentioned; his Majesty hath declared and appointed, by and with the Advice aforesaid, That the Eastern Coast of New South Wales, and the Islands thereunto adjacent, should be the Place or Places beyond Sea to which certain Felons, and other Offenders, should be conveyed and transported: And whereas several Felons and other Offenders have, in pursuance of the said A&, been conveyed and transported to the Fastern Coast of New South Wales, or the Islands thereunto adjacent, there to remain during the Terms Eastern Coast of New South Wales, or the Islands thereunto adjacent, there to remain during the Terms or Times for which they were so respectively sentenced to be transported by the Courts in which they were convicted: And whereas his Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, may hereaster declare and appoint the Place or Places aforefaid, or fome other Place or Places beyond Sea, to be the Place or Places to which other Felons and Offenders shall hereaster be conveyed and transported; and such Felons and Offenders may be so transported accordingly: And whereas it would greatly advance the Design of such Sentences, so carried into Execution as aforesaid, or which may hereafter be passed and carried into Execution, that the Governor, or (in case of his Death or Absence) the Lieutenant Governor for the Time being of such the Place or Places as aforesaid, should have Power and Authority to remit or shorten the Time or Term for which such Felons and Offenders as aforesaid have been or shall hereafter be transported, in Cases where it shall appear that such Felons, or other Offenders, are proper Objects of the Royal Mercy: Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lord's Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That it shall be lawful for his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, at all Times, by his or their Commission under the Great Seal of Great Britain, to authorise and impower the Governor, or the Lieutenant Governor for the Time being, of such Place or Places as aforesaid, or of any of them, by an Instrument in Writing, under the Seal of the Government in which the Place or Places as aforesaid are or shall be situated, to remit, either absolutely or conditionally, the Whole or any Part of as aforesaid are or shall be situated, to remit, either absolutely or conditionally, the Whole or any Part of the Time or Term for which any such Felons, or other Offenders aforesaid, shall have been or shall hereafter be respectively conveyed and transported to such Place or Places as aforesaid; and that such Instrument or Instruments shall have the like Force and Effect, to all Intents and Purposes, as if his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, had in such Cases respectively signified his or their Royal Intention of Mercy under his or their Sign Manual.

II. And be it further enacted, That such Governor or Lieutenant Governor as aforesaid shall, by the first Opportunity, transmit to one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, a Duplicate, under the Seal of the Government, of each and every Instrument as aforesaid by which the Time or Term of Transportation of any such Felons, or other Offenders as aforesaid, hath been remitted or shortened; and that the Names of such Felons, and other Offenders respectively, which thall be contained in such Duplicates as aforesaid, shall be inserted in the next General Pardon which shall pass under the Great Scal of Great Britain, after the Receipt of such Duplicates by one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of
