## C A P. XXIX.

An Act to continue feveral Laws relating to the opening and eftablifhing certain Free Ports in the Ifland of *Jamaica*; to the allowing the free Importation of Sago Powder and Vermicelli from his Majefty's Colonies in *North America*; to the free Importation of certain Raw Hides and Skins from *Ireland*, and the *British* Plantations in *America*; to the allowing the Exportation of Provisions, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, to certain Places in *North America*, which are or may be under the Protection of his Majefty's Arms, and from fuch Places to *Great Britain* and other Parts of his Majefty's Dominions; to the clandestine running of Uncustomed Goods, and preventing Frauds relating to the Customs; to the preventing the clandestine running of Goods, and the Danger of Infection thereby; to the encouraging the Growth of Coffee in his Majefty's Plantations in *America*; to the preventing the committing of Frauds by Bankrupts; and to revive and continue feveral Laws relating to allowing the Exportation of certain Quantities of Wheat and other Articles to his Majefty's Sugar Colonies in *America*; to the empowering his Majefty to prohibit the Exportation, and refrain the carrying Coaftwife, of Copper in Bars, or Copper in Sheets; to the allowing a Drawback of the Duties on Rum fhipped as Stores to be confumed on board Merchant Ships on their Voyages; and to the allowing a Bounty on the Exportation of *British* Corn and Grain in Neutral Ships.

WHEREAS the Laws herein-after mentioned have, by Experience, been found ufeful and beneficial, and are near expiring; may it therefore please your Majefty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's moft Excellent Majefty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this prefent Parliament afsembled, and by the Authority of the fame, That fo much of an Act, made in the fixth Year of the Reign of his prefent Majefty (intituled, *An Act for opening and eftablifhing certain Ports in the Iflands of Jamaica and Dominica; for the more free Importation and Exportation of certain Goods and Merchandizes; for granting certain Duties to defray the Expences of opening, maintaining, fecuring, and improving fuch Ports; for afcertaining the Duties to be paid upon the Importation of Goods from the faid Ifland of Dominica into this Kingdom; and for fecuring the Duties upon Goods imported from the faid Ifland into any other British Colony*), as relates to the opening and eftablifhing certain free Ports in the Ifland of *Jamaica*, which was to continue in force until the firft Day of *November* one thousand feven hundred and feventy-three, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament; and which, by another Act, made in the fourteenth Year of his prefent Majefty's Reign, was continued until the firft Day of *November* one thousand feven hundred and eighty, and from thence to the End of the then Seffion of Parliament; fhall be, and the fame is hereby further continued until the firft Day of *November* one thousand feven hundred and eighty-feven, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament.

So much of 6<sup>th</sup> Geo. 3. &c. as relates to opening certain free Ports in Jamaica,

further continued until Nov. 1, 1787, &c.

II. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That fo much of an Act, made in the feventh Year of the Reign of his prefent Majefty, as relates to allowing the free Importation of Sago Powder and Vermicelli into this Kingdom from his Majefty's Colonies in *North America* for a limited Time, which was to continue in force until the firft Day of *December* one thousand feven hundred and eighty-one, fhall be, and the fame is hereby further continued until the firft Day of *December* one thousand feven hundred and ninety-fix.

So much of 7<sup>th</sup> Geo. 3. as relates to free Importation of Sago Powder, &c. from North America, further continued until Dec. 1, 1796.

III. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That fo much of an Act, made in the ninth Year of the Reign of his prefent Majefty, as relates to the free Importation of certain Raw Hides and Skins from *Ireland*, and the *British* Plantations in *America*, which was to continue in force for five Years, from the firft Day of *June* one thousand feven hundred and fixty-nine, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament; and which, by another Act, made in the fourteenth Year of the Reign of his prefent Majefty, was continued, from the Expiration thereof, for the further Term of five Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament; fhall be, and the fame is hereby further continued until the firft Day of *June* one thousand feven hundred and eighty-fix, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament.

So much of 9<sup>th</sup> Geo. 3. as relates to free Importation of Raw Hides from Ireland and America, further continued until June 1, 1786.

IV. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That an Act, made in the twentieth Year of the Reign of his prefent Majefty (intituled, *An Act to allow the Exportation of Provisions, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, from Great Britain, to certain Towns, Ports, or Places, in North America, which are or may be under the Protection of his Majefty's Arms; and from fuch Towns, Ports, or Places, to Great Britain, and other Parts of his Majefty's Dominions*), which was to be in force until the firft Day of *June* one thousand feven hundred and eighty-one; fhall be, and the fame is hereby further continued until the firft Day of *June* one thousand feven hundred and eighty-two.

IV. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That the several Clauses in an Act, made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his Majesty King GEORGE the First (intituled, *An Act against clandestine running of uncustomed Goods, and for the more effectual preventing of Frauds relating to the Customs*), relating to such foreign Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, as shall be taken in at Sea out of any Ship or Vessel, in order to be landed or put into any other Ship or Vessel or Boat; and also relating to Goods not reported, and found after clearing Ships; and whereby further Remedies are provided against relanding Goods prohibited to be worn in this Kingdom, and foreign Goods shipped out for Parts beyond the Seas; and relating to the opening or altering the Package of Goods on board of Ships outward bound; and also relating to hovering Ships or Vessels of the Burthen of fifty Tons or under; and also concerning the Sales or Package in which Coffee shall be exported; and also relating to Rum imported in Casks or Vessels not containing twenty Gallons at the least; and also relating to Certificate Goods entered in order to be exported to Ireland; which were to have Continuance for the Term of three Years, from the several Times of the Commencement thereof, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament respectively; and which, by several subsequent Acts, passed in the ninth Year of his said Majesty's Reign, and in the second, eighth, fifteenth, sixteenth, twentieth, twenty-seventh and thirty-third Years of the Reign of his late Majesty King GEORGE the Second, and of the seventh and fourteenth Years of the Reign of his present Majesty, were further continued, from the Expiration thereof, until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; shall be, and the same is hereby further continued until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That an Act, made in eighth Year of the Reign of his Majesty King GEORGE the First (intituled, *An Act to prevent the clandestine running of Goods, and the Danger of Infection thereby; and to prevent Ships breaking their Quarantine; and to subject Copper Ore, of the Production of the British Plantations, to such Regulations as other enumerated Commodities of the like Production are subject*), which was to be in force for two Years, from the twenty-fifth Day of March one thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; and which, by several subsequent Acts (except the Clauses obliging all Ships and Vessels to perform Quarantine), was to have further Continuance to the first Day of June one thousand seven hundred and forty-seven, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; and which, by an Act made in the twentieth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King GEORGE the Second, was intended to be further continued to the first Day of June one thousand seven hundred and fifty-four, but by Mistake the Year one thousand seven hundred and forty-seven was inserted therein, instead of the said Year one thousand seven hundred and fifty-four; and which, by several subsequent Acts, made in the twenty-first, twenty-seventh, and thirty-third Years of the Reign of his said late Majesty, and of the seventh and fourteenth Years of the Reign of his present Majesty, was further continued from the Expiration thereof until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; shall be, and the same is hereby further continued until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.

VII. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That an Act, made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King GEORGE the Second, for the encouraging the Growth of Coffee in his Majesty's Plantations in America, which was to continue in force from the twenty-fifth Day of March one thousand seven hundred and thirty-five, until the twenty-fifth Day of March one thousand seven hundred and thirty-nine, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; and which, by several subsequent Acts, made in the eleventh, nineteenth, twenty-fifth and thirty-second Years of his said late Majesty's Reign, and of the sixth and fourteenth Years of the Reign of his present Majesty, was further continued from the Expiration thereof, until the twenty-fourth Day of June, one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; except such Part thereof as relates to the Importation and Exportation of foreign Coffee into and from the British Colonies and Plantations in America; shall be, and the same is hereby further continued until the twenty-fourth Day of June one thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament.

VIII. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That an Act, made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King GEORGE the Second (intituled, *An Act to prevent the committing of Frauds by Bankrupts*), which was to continue in force from the twenty-fourth Day of June one thousand seven hundred and thirty-two, for the Space of three Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; and which, by several subsequent Acts, made in the ninth and sixteenth Years of his said Majesty's Reign, was further continued until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and fifty; and, by an Act made in the twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of his said late Majesty, was amended, and further continued until the first Day of September one thousand seven hundred and fifty-seven; and which, by several subsequent Acts, made in the thirty-first Year of his said late Majesty's Reign, and the fourth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, was further continued until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and seventy-one; and which, by an Act made in the twelfth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, was amended, and further continued until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and seventy-five, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament; and by another Act made in the sixteenth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, was further continued until the twenty-ninth Day of September one thousand seven hundred and eighty,

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That so much of an Act, made in the sixteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty (intituled, *An Act for allowing the Exportation of certain Quantities of Wheat, and other Articles, to his Majesty's Sugar Colonies in America, and to the Island of Saint Helena, and to the other Settlements belonging to the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, and of Biscuit and Pease to Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Bay Chaleur, and Labrador; and for indemnifying all Persons with respect to advising or carrying into Execution his Majesty's Orders of Council already made for allowing the Exportation of Wheat, and other Articles*), as relates to allowing the Exportation of certain Quantities of Wheat, and other Articles, to his Majesty's Sugar Colonies in America, which was to continue in force until the first Day of January one thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven; and which, by several Acts, made in the seventeenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, and twentieth Years of the Reign of his present Majesty, was continued until the first Day of May one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one; shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be revived; and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in full Force and Effect until the first Day of May one thousand seven hundred and eighty-two.

X. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That an Act, made in the twentieth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty (intituled, *An Act to empower his Majesty to prohibit the Exportation, and to restrain the carrying Coastwise, of Copper in Bars, or Copper in Sheets, for a limited Time*), which was to continue in force until the first Day of May one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one, shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be revived; and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in full Force and Effect until the first Day of May one thousand seven hundred and eighty-two.

XI. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That so much of an Act, made in the nineteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, as relates to allowing a Drawback of the Duties on Rum shipped as Stores to be consumed on board Merchant Ships on their Voyages, which was to be in force for two Years, from the first Day of April one thousand seven hundred and seventy nine, shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be revived; and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in full Force and Effect until the first Day of April one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three.

XII. And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That an Act, made in the twentieth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty (intituled, *An Act for allowing a Bounty on the Exportation of British Corn and Grain, in Ships the Property of Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with his Majesty*), which was to be in force until the twenty-fifth Day of March one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one, shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be revived; and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in full Force and Effect until the twenty-fifth Day of March one thousand seven hundred and eighty-two.

C A P. XXX.

An Act for continuing, and making more effectual, several Acts of Parliament passed for cleansing and making navigable the Channel from the Hythe at Colchester to Wivenhoe, in the County of Essex; and for repairing and cleansing the Streets of the Town of Colchester; and also for lighting the Streets and Lanes, and for preventing Annoyances in the said Town.

C A P. XXXI.

An Act for the better Management and Collection of the Duties upon Male Servants, granted by an Act made in the seventeenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty.

WHEREAS by an Act, made in the seventeenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for granting to his Majesty a Duty upon all Servants retained or employed in the several Capacities therein mentioned; and for repealing several Rates and Duties upon Glass, imposed by an Act made in the nineteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, and for granting to his Majesty other Rates and Duties upon Glass in lieu thereof, and for the better collecting the Duties upon Glass; and for repealing the several Rates and Duties charged, by an Act made in the twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of his said late Majesty, upon all Persons and Bodies Politick and Corporate, having certain Quantities of Silver Plate, certain Duties were imposed upon every Male Servant retained or employed in the Capacities in the said Act particularly enumerated and mentioned: And whereas one other Act of Parliament was made in the eighteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, for the more effectual levying of the Duty upon Servants in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland: And whereas one other Act of Parliament was made in the nineteenth Year of the Reign of his said present Majesty, for amending so much of the said Act made in the seventeenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, as imposes a Duty upon all Servants retained or employed in the several Capacities therein mentioned: And whereas the several Powers, Rules, Methods, and Regulations, in the said Acts prescribed and directed, for ascertaining, paying, securing, and collecting the said Duties, and for preventing Evasion and Frauds therein, have been found insufficient and ineffectual to secure the Payment thereof, and the said Duties have been withheld, and the Revenue thereby defrauded: For Remedy whereof, and for the better securing the due Payment of the said Duties,*
